# COLD SUBJECT

Prospect of More Bitter Bickering Over Discovery of North Pole

DR. COOK AND PEARY HEAD FOR NEW YORK

Confirmation of Storey That Peary Made Free With Cook's Supplies

NEW YORK, Sept. 13 .- That polar olemics could not only generate but maintain unabated such heat needed the seeing and hearing to believe, but with Dr. Cook homeward bound and Commander Peary now In touch with correspondents, two swelling streams of

correspondents, two swelling streams of conflicting information are now centered on a city already boiling over. Comment and criticism lack nothing of their previous activity.

The previous assumption that Commander Peary would have the United States navy solidly behind him was not borne out in a letter from Rear Admiral schiety, retired, made public today by Captain B. S. Osborn, secretary of the Arctic Club of America, of which Cook is a member. The letter, under date of September 11, from Pocono Manor, Pa, runs in part as follows: "I like Cook's attitude immensely in this unfortunate, unnecessary and canwise controversy. He certainly has been dignified and manly in the stand he has taken in this matter."

He was secretary of the Arctic Club while I was chairman of the executive committee. If I have ever known a man of integrity, probity, sincerity and modesty, it is Dr. Cook.

"Dr. Cook is but an ordinary physician. The other, being in the navy, is supposed to have received the training of a gentleman, yet when Cook heard that Peary had discovered the Pole, he congratulated him. ST. JOHN'S, NFD., Sept. 12.—Allan Whitten, who was boatswain of the Peary auxiliary steamer Erik in 1905, and again in 1908, gives his quota to the Polar controversy today. On his expeditions he naturally saw much of Peary and Peary's plans. He was also in the Erik in the summer of 1907, when she lay for a week in Sydney harbor alongside the schooner John R. Bradley, in which Dr. Cook was starting for the Pole. The Erik that year was going to Hudson's Bay for the government. Whitten says that the Bradley was abundantly equipped for Cook's expedition, having supplies for at least three years.

He contirms Cook's charge at Copenhagen that Peary's people took Cook's provisions, adding that not only did the crew of the ship take Dr. Cook's stores that were at Etah, but boats were sent to Annotok, thirty miles distant, to remove Cook's provisions which were stored there. Whitten admitted, however, that he did not know if this removal was by arrangement between Rudolphe Francke, who was left in charge of the provisions, and Peary, or Peary's representatives. The boatswaln also made the statement that Cook's and Francke's collections of ivory and skins, some of them very valuable, were likewiso taken. Ho said that the trouble with Peary's previous expeditions had been lack of supplies. # GERMANY'S ARMY IN BATTLE ARRAY

Frontier Attack and Defence Experiments at Annual Manoeuvres

MERGENTHURM, Wuertemburg, Sept. 13.—The annual maneuvres of the Imperial army began here today. It was eleven o'clock in the morning when as a result of political tension between two imaginary states, the red and the blue, war was declared and word sent forth by wireless, field telephone and telegraph, heliograph, motor bicycle and orderly throughout the 120,000 officers and men. The problem set by the two commanders is that of frontier fighting. The red army will have to hold the frontier.

The military authorities have awakened to the special requirements of frontier fighting, with the result that all the cavalry is performing the functions of mounted infantry, armed with the new army carbines, which are longer than the old model.

Emperor William arrived on the field at 10 o'clock. He mounted a horse in the blue territory and watched the cavalry advance. His Majesty is living in the plainest quarters, and will motor out each day to the scene

will motor out each day to the scene of the maneuvres.

The military dirigible Gross II made its first appearance on the field today. The airship ascended in a heavy mist and cruised at a low altitude. It was not long before the enemy observed it and the red machine guns opened fire. The Gross II retreated and vanished in the mist, but it is reported here tonight that the airship was caught in a tree and was later captured by the reds.

### IRRIGATION HELPS

Fall Wheat in Calgary District Illus-trates Benefit of Applying Water

CALGARY, Sept. 13.—"Two acres of my spring wheat goes 60 bushels to the acre; the balance runs 40 bushels. While the latter yield pays handsomely, I could have secured 60 bushels per acre from the entire field by applying water," such is the statement of Mr. Budd, of Gleichen.

When asked the cause of the increased yield, he said: "A portion of the field yielding 60 bushels was subirrigated, water from the ditch percolating through the soil and reaching the roots of a strip of wheat two acres in extent and adjacent to the ditch. This wheat secured more moisture than the portion of the field depending upon natural rainfall, and this is the only reason for the 50 per cent increase in yield. Next year I will use water and increase my entire crop returns 50 per cent."

# OF HARRIMAN

Dead Magnate's Close Friend at Head of Union Pacific Executive -

#### OTHER DIRECTORS ARE IN SYMPATHY

President to Be Chosen at Shareholders' Meeting Next Month

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—The continuance of the Harriman policy in the management of Union Pacific, the Southern Pacific and the chain of allied railroads, was made certain today, temporarily at least, when Robert S. Lovett, E. H. Harriman's personal counsel and close friend, was elected to succeed him at the head of the executive committee of the Union Pacific railroad.

To strengthen further the dominance of the "Harriman idea," Jacob H. Scheff and Wm. Rockefeller, both heavily interested in the Harriman enterprises, were elected directors in place of Mr. Harriman and the late H. H. Rogers, and were also chosen to places on the executive committee. The Union Pacific still remains without a president, as Mr. Harriman occupied this position also. It is understood, however, that an operating man, probably L. F. Lorree, president of the Delaware & Hudson, will be elected for the place at the annual meeting of the stockholders to be held on October 12. Proxies for this meeting are in the hands of Judge Lovett and Alexander Miller, secretary of the Union Pacific, and seem to guarantee that the election will be dictated by the Harriman interests. The directors of the Southern Pacific will meet tymorow.

### CHILDREN KILLED

Mysterious Tragedy Occurs in Italian Colony at Utica, N. Y.—No Trace of Murderer

UTICA, N. Y., Sept. 13.—One of the most cruel, as well as one of the most mysterious murders in the history of Oneida county was discovered at about 5 o'clock this morning. It was undoubtedly perpetrated last night. The criminal, whose identity is unknown, is believed to be an Italian, and his victims are fatalian children. Three little ones, lured away from their homes by a man unknown to them, shot down by him and left all night in a lonely spot, where there was no possibility of anyone finding them before daylight, is the story of the crime.

The oldest child, Theresa Procipic, aged seven years, was instantly killed, a 36-calibre bullet entering her breast aged seven years, was instantly killed, a 36-calibre bullet entering her breast and passing entirely through her body. A younger child, aged three years, was shot in the intestines, and is not expected to live throughout the night. The third child, aged six, Fanny Infusino, a sister of the baby, was shot in the arm. The latter two were conscious throughout the night of the crime. The little girl remained with her brother beside the dead body of their companion until all three were discovered. The police are entirely at sea regarding the identity of the murderer and the motive for the crime. Several Italians were arrested today, but were released after an examination, and tonight the city officials of the criminal. The children all lived in the same house at 421 Bleecker street.

## SUTTON CASE AGAIN

Body of Dead Naval Student Exhumed and Autopsy Performed at Mother's Request

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—When the body of Jas. N. Sutton, the naval student, whose death occurred about two years ago at Annapolis, was ex-

student, whose death occurred about two years ago at Annapolls, was exhumed at, Arlington cemetery this afternoon an autopsy performed by physicians representing the navy department and young Sutton's mother, disclosed the fact that no bones were broken, although a contusion was found over the right eye. It had been Mrs. Sutton's contention that her son's arm had been broken in the fight which preceded his death, and that this being the case, the shot which ended his life could not have been self inflicted.

Dr. Geo. Tully Vaughan, of this city, who represented Mrs. Sutton at the autopsy, said tonight that the bullet which caused his death was three inches above the right ear, and was clean cut. There was no indication that the hair and scalp had been burned by powder. Attorney Vandyke, assistant counsel for Mrs. Sutton, said tonight that he was convinced that the shot had been fired at least five feet from the officer's head, and that the wound showed conclusively that it was a physical impossibility for Sutton to have fired the shot.







# ARE AFRAID OF BOARD OF TRADE

Ald. Henderson and Fullerton Profess to See Ulterior Motive in Request

Because the board of trade has written the city council stating that as the board's attention has been called to the apparently serious position of the water question here which is still further complicated by the recent rejection of the Water Loan Guarantee By-law, and teels that a committee of the board might render assistance to the council by investigating the subject, and to do so intelligently such committee would have to have all necessary facts in possession of the council at its disposal, Aldermen Henderson and Fullerton protess to see an intention, on the part Aldermen Henderson and Fullerion pro-tess to see an intention, on the part of the board, to intrude itself into the matter and take from the council that body's sovereign right as the elected representatives of the people, to settle all matters pertaining to the welfare

all matters pertaining to the welfare of the city.

The communication from the board of trade asked that the council place at the disposal of the board all the available information in its possession bearing on the water question and permit the city officials to give such futer information as may appear necessary from time to time.

Alderman Fullerton declared that any other body, the Trades and Labor Council, for instance, should have the same privilege as that asked for by the board of trade. It looked as if the board of trade desired to take the matter out of the hands of the council. The board had evidently taken an active part in the recent voting on the power and water by-laws.

Entitled to Information.

Mayor Hall believed that any representative body which desired the information should get it. As for the board of trade working in favor of the water measure such had not been the case. Many members of the board favored the expropriation of the Esquimalt waterworks undertaking but many others did not. The board, as a board, did not take any stand on that bylaw though it did in regard to the power measure.

Alderman Henderson was willing to admit that any information which the council could consistently give should be handed to the board but he did not like the idea of the appointment of a committee by the board to work with the council. The city council is elected to represent the people and it is not called upon to work with any other body of depute any of its authority or responsibility to that body. He was afraid too that if the council gave any information to the board committee the latter would disseminate it probably for purposes antagonistic to the object for which the council is working.

Ald. Stewart believed that any person seeking information should get it. So far the board of trade is the only body to ask for such information, but others may-have it if they wish it. The impression conveyed by Ald. Henderson's remarks was that the city council is evidently afraid to give out any information it may possess. Ald. Henderson, Ald. Stewart declared, 'took the cake' when it came to twisting things about and finding hidden meanings in ordinary statements. The board of trade is simply taking that interest in an important matter, which every body and individual should take.

Ald. Ross opined that the board of trade knew more about the water question than did the council. Two years ago the people had voted on and carried a referendum to go to Sooke lake, but nothing was done, and recently the by-law to expropriate the holdings of the Esquimalt Water. Works Company was submitted. It was about time, Ald. Ross believed, that talking ceased and something definite were done. There were the reports of two engineers. Get a report from a third and go ahead.

Mayor Hall stated that the referendum did not authorize the council to go to Sooke lake instanter, but merely to secure Sooke lake as a further source of supply. That had been done by securing the reserve on the waters there. Ald. Henderson and Fullerton declared that the 'electors voted on the referendum with the idea that Sooke lake was to be the city's source of an enlarged supply.

The discussion ended by the council deciding to give the board of trade whatever information is available as requested.

#### AN ANNIVERSARY.

Yesterday was the one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the capture of Quebec by the English forces under General Wolfe. Perhaps, owing to the fact that the battle on the Plains of Abraham terminated in favor of the English, our French fellow-Canadians might feel the special celebration of the anniversary to be hardly in good taste; and vet, when we reflect that on that day the beginning was made of the Canadian nation, we are not sure that there should not be some special recognition of the anniversary. on the well-fought field that day, so in the great work of developing half a continent. As both leaders in the famous battle laid down their lives, so, to make perfect the work begun that day, there must be sacrifices on both sides among those who are working out the problems growing out of the

CANADA MALIGNED. An individual, who conceals his identity, but discloses his character by the initials "D. F.," writes a letter to the Indian Planters' Gazette, giving his impressions of Canada. He begins by saying that the cultivation of Manitoba must ever remain backward unless fall wheat is sown. He found the present season exceedingly unfavorable for wheat. He condemns the roads, and represents the Canadian Pacific irrigation project as unneces-He says the wheat trade is controlled by magnates by means of graft, and asserted that an inquiry into the matter resulted in nothing because there was too much trust money flying about." But it is when he gets to British Columbia that D. F. makes his most remarkable statements. He says there is no cultivation anywhere in the province until you get as far west as Revelstoke, and he explains this by saying: "Soil there is none. Gravel and stones is everywhere, the soil mixed with a few inches of vegetable matter." Again, he says as a warning to intending settlers: "British Columbia has no soil-only a climate." To this of misinformation he adds: They should also clearly understand that there are no free land from the government." (The grammar is his.) Having delivered himself of this, he upbraids the government for not leasing land to actual settlers; but surely it would be a wicked thing to lease land on which there is no soil. he complains that the land is covered with heavy timber and immense boulders, and says: "The fruit crop, about which one hears so much, is imaginary, as there is no local sale, nor is there any exports." His observations in regard to fruit are simply outrageous. For example, he says that in Vancouver the whole apple crop had to be destroyed because of blights. He asserts that "you cannot buy a single fruit here that was ever grown grown in the country." He relates how people, deceived by the government, come here, spend their little all, and then begin a wandering life, cursing the day they ever saw British Columbia. "The disappointment of life here is gradually filling the lunatic asylums," he remarks. We shall not take up space to refute these charges, for the proper place to do this is in the pages of the publication where they appeared. Magistrate Jay Gives Decision on Important Point in Police Court

Magistrate Jay decided in the city police court yesterday morning that a police officer may properly refuse to divulge his private instructions regarding the enforcement of law. Frances Simpson had been charged with keeping a disorderly house at No. 54 Discovery street, and on Saturday Capt. Palmer was asked when on the witness stand by J. A. Alkman, for the defence, whether he had orders to prosecute all the keepers of such places within the bounds of a certain district. He had refused to answer, and the case was adjourned until this morning, when Magistrate Jay upheld him in his refusal.

H. W. R. Moore, city prosecutor, pro H. W. R. Moore, city prosecutor, produced many authorities and argued that if it was held that the witness must answer the information thus elicited would not be in the public interest. Mr. Aikman produced authorities to the end that there could not be privilege in countenancing fraud, and argued that it was not right that action should be taken against some people while others were allowed liberties which the law did not permit. Magistrate Jay intimated that if Mr. Aikman advocated an inpulry into the police

which the law did not permit. Magistrate Jay intimated that if Mr. Alkman advocated an inquiry into the police administration the matter was one to be referred to the police commissioners. Mr. Alkman charged, in reply, that the department was not being properly conducted and that those responsible for this should be dealt with.

Magistrate Jay then disallowed the question, stating Captain Palmer was within his rights in refusing to answer, the point raised by the question being irrelevant to the issue. The accused was charged with keeping a bawdy house, and counsel were limited to eliciting information to prove or disprove this allegation.

After further evidence had been given and after a plea for mercy on the ground that there were other similar houses outside of the "restricted" area. Magistrate Jay found the accused guilty and inflicted a fine of \$75.

Wong Fee, a Chinese, found guilty of stealing two bolts of cloth, valued at \$40, from Chin Ching, a Chinese tallor of Government street, was sentenced to three months' imprisonment.

James Wallace was sentenced to a month's imprisonment for vagrancy, and several drunks were fined.

#### JUDGMENT GIVEN IN PLAINTIFF'S FAVOR

Mr. Justice Martin Gives Decision in the Action by Hird Against E. & N.

In the action brought by Hird vs the Esquimalt & Nanalmo Railway Company in the Supreme court claiming damages because the defendant company has sold plaintiff 135 acres in the Somenos district, comprising three mineral claims, and were unable to give a clear title to 38 acres and a fraction owing to a mistake made owing to the mineral claims not being plotted on the official map. Mr. Justice Martin gave judgment in favor of the plaintiff for \$191.80. This was the amount that had been offered by the railway company as prorata of the \$675.35 paid by Hird. The judgment carried costs in favor of the plaintiff. When it was discovered that the title to the portion of the land was not clear the railway company offered to refund the proportions to amount of the purchase price, although no money was paid into court. The company also made a counter claim for rectification of the deed on the ground that a mistake had been made. Hird refused the proferred money and, holding that the fraction of the land to which no title could be given, was of importance in his mining operations, he claimed damages. Mr. Justice Martin found no evidence convincing him of this contention and intimated that the offer made by the railway company should have been accepted. He gave judgment in favor of plaintiff for that amount.

## Here and There

Victoria is growing, and we are all very proud of its progress. We like to walk along the streets on Sundays or holidays and see the minny new and artistic homes that are going up in all directions. The pretty, gardens and the velvety green of the lawns and boulevards are admired by all visitors in these early autumn days. The troops of well dressed school children to be seen every morning, and the new school buildings being erected show that many of the newcomers are the girls and boys who are to be Victoria's future citizens. We are told that very soon we must make further provision for the older pupils, and the crowded condition of the High School and the University classes is evidence of the value set upon education by the citizens generally. There was a time when Victorians were apathetic in the matter of providing necessary school accommodation, but that time has passed. Every one now recognizes that good school buildings are not only needed for the children living in Victoria, but that they attract the very best class of new residents. It is quite true that at the Central School there are still many rooms occupied by classes which are far from being suitable either from an educational or a sanitary point of view. But when the new buildings are finished it should be possible to abandon the worst of them.

them.

Yet, while we do well to congratulate ourselves upon our schools and upon the excellence of the system of and the thoroughness of the teaching there is room for inquiry as to whether in our city all of the children are being reached.

We know that in older cities there requarters of the town where families we in ignorance and destitution, and hat the noblest of men and women are devoting their lives to the work of removing from them the children who find there an environment which makes purity and health, whether of mind, body, or soul. Impossible. Can we hope that in our own beautiful city we can do anything to prevent the formation of a slum? It does seem as if where all who are willing and able to work can find employment this should be possible. There may be those who think there is no need of malding any provision and no danger of such conditions arising as have been indicated An incident, out of many that might be related, may show that there is more need of watchfulness and of precaution than might be supposed. About five years ago a pretty little girl was admitted to one of the classrooms of the city schools. It was evident enough that the child was poor, for she was illclad and not very clean. She was, however, both doclle and clever, and for a time made fair progress notwithstanding irregular attendance. She had no mother, and a younger brother was under her care. Her father provided the children well with food, but in most other ways they were allowed to shift for themselves. The little girl of eleven or twelve was found guilty of some act of, dishonesty and suspended. This practically ended her school life, for she was shamed to return, and, very likely, the teacher, afraid of the influence of this waif upon the other pupils, made no very great effort to induce her to do so.

For many months she found in the reading room of the city library a refuge from the cold, and in the illustrated papers a source of interest and diversion. But her time was not always, perhaps not often, so profitably employed. The Children's Aid Society tried to obtain control of her and her brother. But the father promised to take better care of his children and the application of the society was affused. In the course of a few months the little fellow was up before the mag, strate, and was sent to the reformatory.

The girl obtained employment. But what hope was there that without training, brought up to spend most of her time on the streets, she should have either the industry or the application necessary to retain a situation?

her time on the streets, she should have either the industry or the application necessary to retain a situation? Is there any need to tell what became of the friendless, motherless girl of seventeen, who, if she had been cared for might have grown to be a beautiful woman, while to earn an honest living in almost any capacity?

It is easy to say she was a bad girl whose weak character led her to inevitable ruin. But what chance had she to be anything else? This is but one of many stories that might be told. And yet we, one and all of us, like the good people of the parable, "pass by on the other side," while these child neighbors of ours go on to ruin. There is need that something should be done, and at once. Who will suggest a remedy? Neither the churches nor the schools as at present organized can meet such cases. What right have we to call ourselves a Christian community while we permit little girls to live among us uncared for and unprotected? Unless we bestir ourselves we need not flatter ourselves that Victoria will in her growth and prosperity escape the dangers into which older cities have fallen.

There are many girls who when choosing their occupations imagine that the one that needs least intelligence is household work. Often the mother keeps the girl at home to help her who does not give promise of being successful in school.

Report From Glasgow States That Grand Trunk Is Securing Two Fine Vessels

**NEGOTIATING FOR** CAIRO AND HELIOPOLIS

Victorian Travelling on Clyde Hears Report to This Effect From Shipbuilders

The latest report with regard to steamship service for the Grand Trunk Pacific is that the company is negotiating for two fine turbine liners, the Cairo and Heliopolis, for its service in the Pacific. The report, given for what it is worth, comes from Glasgow. A Victorian now travelling in the United Kingdom, writing to a friend here says: "I cannot express to you my impressions of the immense shipbuilding yards I have seen on the Clyde. I was in conversation with some shipping men here, and was surprised to hear from them that the Grand Trunk people had bought, or were buying, two steamers was getting them ready for the Pacific. Their names are the Cairo and Heliopolis. They are reputed to be two of the finest steamers in Great Britain, both turbines, and fitted up in the most turbines, and fitted up in the most costly and rich style for the Marsellies and Egyptian trade. The Cairo and Heliopolis are two fine steamers which have been in the market for the past few months, and were recently offered for sale by auction at the upset price of £150,000 each without a bid being made for them. Since this time, in mid-May, the two steamers have been lying idle. The vessels were built for a steamship company engaged in the Mediterranean and Egyptian tourist trade which falled last year. They were built to the highest class at Lloyds by the builders of the Princess Charlotte, the well known Fairfield Shipbuilding and Engineering Company, Ltd., at their works at Govan. The Heliopolis was launched in November of 1907, and the Cairo during January of the following year. They are fitted with triple-screw Parsons turbine engines, manufactured by the Fairfield Company and have eight cylindrical boilers, fitted with Howden's forced draught.

If the report given circulation on the Clyde is correct, the two steamers will require alteration for their passenger accommodations are not suitable for the Pacific trade as it is at present. They have luxurious accommodation for 709 'irst. and 281 second-class passengers. Both have three decks, besides three-promenade decks. chinery in the old traveler is heavy and cumbersome when compared with modern appliances, and the only way the wreckers have in disintregrating the wreck is by the use of dynamite. These were removed without being broken up, the men doing the work having to disconnect the pumps and get tackle round them at low water, when they were standing submerged up to their necks. The men on the Yosemite expect that it will take over a month of constant work to strip the vessel, after which they will wait until the high tides of December, when the vessel, relieved of the weight of all her engines and machinery, will be floated ashore and set on fire. She is sheathed with copper and is copperfastened throughout, and the easiest way of obtaining this copper is by destroying the wooden hull. The wreckers say that notwithstanding the forty-five years "constant service to which the old ...vessel.-was subjected, her timbers are still sound.

# AND MARK WRECKS

Test of Invention of Seattle Man to Be Made From Gov.ernment Wharf Today

At the government wharf, near where the steamer Quadra is moored, an interesting test of a newly-invented lifesaving and wreck-locating gear invented by Frank P. Brust, of Seattle, will take place this afternoon at three o'clock. Mr. Brust, who is a guest at the Driard hotel, said that during his many years of travel in northern waters, dating from 1883, when he was on board the old Ancon, he has noted the need of better gear for saving life, and also for locating a wreck, and a few months ago, after several years of effort, he patented the device which he will exhibit this afternoon before a number of prominent shipping men and others, who have been invited to attend. will take place this afternoon at three

The invention is a buoy held in a cylindrical tank fast to a steamer's deck, with a connecting rope colled on a windlass, and when a vessel sinks equipped with this gear, the inrush of water through apertures in the cylinder forces the buoy free, and it floats to the surface. The buoy, which is pear-shaped, and surmounted by a bell rung by the action of the waves, has a number of buoys attached to it. The released buoy floated up from a sunken wreck not only marks the spot The released buoy floated up from a sunken wreck not only marks the spot where the vessel foundered and the depth—this is shown by the marking of the line released from the windlass—but offers succor to the survivors. They are attracted by the ringing of the bell to the buoy, where, on reaching it, they can easily detach the lifebuoys fastened to it, and cling to lashings made fast to it.

The test will be made under the direction of the inventor this afternoon.



# WANT CITY TO CONTRIBUTE MORE

Fort Street Owners Object to Paying More Than City for Pavement

While the owners on Fort street. between the junction with Yates street and Oak Bay avenue, are quite willing that that part of the thoroughfare should be paved, they object to paying the proportion of cost which the city has decided upon. The question came up some three months ago, when the city decided that it would contribute one-third of the cost and the owners two-thirds. This arrangement was objected to by the owners and nothing further was done until recently, when the announcement was made that the B. C. Electric Company, because of the fact that its tracks occupy nearly one-half of the rondway, and because, too, a pavement would improve matters for the company at that narrow portion of Fort street, would contribute \$6,000 towards the cost in addition to the amount which it must pay for the converte foundation under its tracks. The total cost of the work is estimated at \$27,000 dwhich the city was to pay \$9,000, leaving \$12,000 for the owners to pay or about forty-two per cent. Now the owners desire that after the payment by the company is deducted the city should pay one-half of the bullance, making thirty-seven per cent, for the city and the same amount for the owners. and Oak Bay avenue, are quite will-

Castle, president of the Union Trust Company, of this city, a director of other well known corporations, and prominent in club and social life, committed suicide today by cutting his throat with a razor in the Grand Union hotel, at Park avenue and 42nd street. His body was found shortly after 9 o'clock by his brother, Burton S. Castle, who summoned a physician, but Mr. Castle was beyond aid. His body was cold, and the bloody razor which he had used to take his life lay on a table nearby. He left no notes or instructions, and his brother ascribes his act to a nervous breakdown. nervous breakdown. According to the hotel management Mr. Castle, accompanied by his Mr. Castle, accompanied by his brother and a friend, Eli Spring, came

Mr. Castle, accompanied by his brother and a friend. Ell Spring, came to the hotel three days ago and procured adjoining rooms. It was the brother's intention, according to the hotel authorities, to look after Mr. Castle while he was in such a nervous condition, and Mr. Spring volunteered his assistance.

For some reason the suicide banker was left alone this afternoon, and on returning Burton found his door locked. In alarm the door was forced open and the tragedy revealed. Dressed only in his under garments, the body lay across the bed, while the position of the razor on a table in another part of the room indicated that he had stood before a mirror, gashed his throat from ear to ear, almost severing the Jugular vein, then staggered to the bed, where death overtook him.

Mr. Castle was married and lived at 540 Park avenue. He is survived by his widow and a son and daughter.
