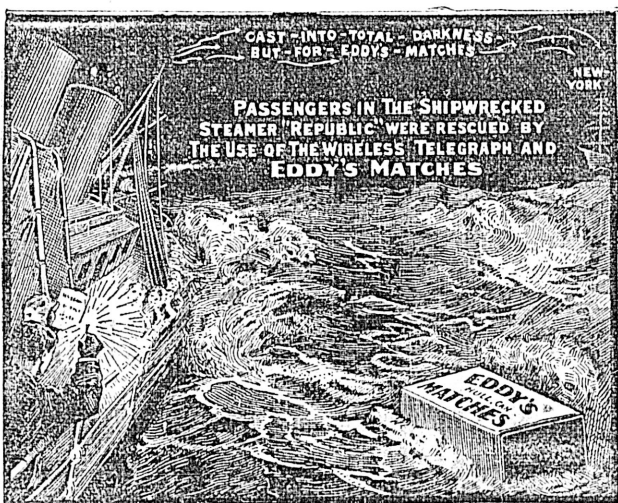

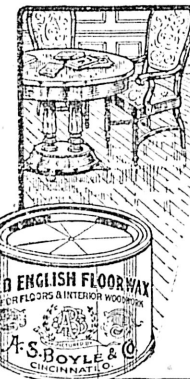

WOMEN'S COUNCIL IN SESSION HERE

Disapprove of Permitting Betting at Fall Fair—Heavy Budget of Business

The regular quarterly meeting of the Local Council of Women of Victoria was held in the city hall yesterday afternoon at 2.30 p. m. The president, Mrs. C. E. Cooper in the chair, and a good attendance of members and delegates from the affiliated societies present.

Mrs. Jenkins, recording secretary, read the minutes of the previous meeting, which were adopted.

The corresponding secretary's report was then received, after which a number of letters were read.

Premier McBride wrote thanking the council for the invitation to preside at the luncheon held in honor of the delegates from the Quinquennial, and complimenting the ladies on the success of the reception. The letter was received and filed.

A letter was read from Miss Cummings, the secretary of the National Society asking for representation at the coming executive meeting in Toronto on the 28th inst., and asking that if any contributions were due they should be sent.

The secretary was asked to write saying that it would be impossible, owing to the shortness of the notice, to make any arrangements for representation and the treasurer reported all dues paid.

Miss Crease Resigns

A letter was received from Miss Crease resigning her position as a member of the council on account of the pressure of other duties and of ill-health.

The letter came as a complete surprise to the council, and there was a general expression of regret, which was voiced by Mrs. Jenkins, who said that the valued help and the cool and calm judgment of Miss Crease would be greatly missed by the council women. She moved that the secretary be asked to write a letter to Miss Crease conveying the sorrow of the ladies at her resignation and their hope that she would speedily recover her usual health.

Mrs. Williscroft seconded the motion. In putting it the president expressed her sense of personal loss in an officer whose support had been so valuable. Mrs. Hasell also spoke feelingly on the subject. Mrs. Houston, of Revelstoke, was introduced as a visitor to the council by Mrs. Spofford as a lady active in many public spirited enterprises.

A card of thanks for the hospitality of the Council of Victoria, signed by the president, Miss Gino Krog, and all the Norwegian delegates was read and received with gratification.

A letter from the president, Mrs. Cooper, to Mrs. Richards, asking for information regarding the woman's building was read. Mrs. Richards answered saying that when the enterprise had been undertaken she did not anticipate that there would be bookmaking at the fall races. She, however, showed the advantage the building would be to the women of Victoria, thanked the societies for their co-operation, and hoped they would work loyally to fulfil their pledges of support. She regretted that it was impossible for her to be present during the exhibition.

The treasurer reported that no business for the council had been done. But the committee for the entertainment of the delegates had expended \$888 and had a balance of \$5.75 on hand. The report was received with gratification. The treasurer, Mrs. Gould, was thanked for her very valuable services, and the committee discharged with the thanks of the council.

A letter was received from the provincial vice-president, Mrs. Day pointing out that there were no funds for provincial organization. A provincial conference had been held in Victoria in 1908, at which it was resolved that the conferences should hereafter be held annually in October, and an invitation to attend one in Vancouver had been accepted. It had, however, been deemed by Mrs. Day advisable to defer the conference till funds had been raised for the payment of the expenses of the delegates, and she had written to the council for an expression of opinion, and asked the Victoria Council for their decision on the matter.

A reference was then made to the decision of the Quinquennial on Provincial organization and Mrs. Day said she would be glad at any time to give an account of the proceedings.

Woman's Edition

Mrs. Day then said that she had obtained from the managing director of the Colonist permission to issue a woman's edition of the paper, and asked the advice of the council as to whether it should be issued the Sunday preceding the annual meeting or the Wednesday after that it might contain a full report of the proceedings. The letter gave rise to an animated discussion in which many of the members took part. It was finally decided that, the issue of the paper was undertaken by Mrs. Day in her capacity as vice-president and an official of the National Council, the date of the issue must be left entirely to her own judgment.

As to the date of the meeting of the Provincial Conference, the Victoria Councils agreed to abide by the decision of the other local councils of the province. It was also agreed that Mrs. Day be asked to meet the council and explain clearly the action of the Quinquennial on the matter of provincial organization.

A letter on this subject from Mrs. Cummings was ordered to be put upon the minutes.

A statement in the Toronto News that the publication of the Woman's edition of the Colonist had been accepted by the local council was read by Mrs. Perkins and pointed out as incorrect. A number of resolutions from the affiliated societies were read and ordered to be placed on the preliminary agenda.

Central Schools' Principal

The president brought up the matter of the recent decision of the school trustees to appoint a man or principal over the boys and girls schools before the meeting. It was decided to leave to the president and the president of the Mothers' club the task of writing to the trustees pointing out the advisability of having a girls' school in the city and allowing its principal to be a woman.

WILL PROHIBIT WOOD EXPORT

Quebec Government Policy in Connection With Pulp and Paper

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—The province of Quebec has definitely decided to prohibit the exportation of pulpwood cut from Crown lands. In September, 1906, the premier of the province made a promise that the stumpage rate of 60 cents per cord on wood cut from Crown lands would not be raised for a period of ten years. It is intended to carry out that pledge, and no increase in stumpage charges will be made till September, 1910.

Resolution Adopted

The following resolution was unanimously passed:

"The officers and members of the Local Council of Women of Victoria hereby enter a grave and earnest protest against the action of the board of directors of the Agricultural association in allowing bookmakers at the fall races and we also place on record our sense that we have been unfairly dealt with by those who introduced the bookmakers in that after we had been induced to pledge ourselves to support the fair in the interests of the Women's building under the impression that everything connected with the fair would be conducted on the same lines as last year without any warning being given to us that an element of which we wholly disapprove would be introduced in connection with the fair, and without our being allowed any voice in the matter."

At a later hour than usual the meeting adjourned.

Veteran Jurist Passes

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 13.—Judge Martin F. Morris, formerly chief justice of the court of appeals of the District of Columbia and one of the oldest and most prominent members of the bar in Washington, died at his home here yesterday, aged 73 years. Judge Morris was a conspicuous figure in the noted trial of John H. Surratt, one of the alleged conspirators against President Lincoln. He engaged as one of the attorneys for the defence at that time.

Down to a Prosaic Basis

PARIS, Sept. 13.—Francis Laur, a French engineer and inventor, announces the invention of a flying machine capable of transporting merchandise and passengers, and has officially asked the municipal council to grant him a franchise for the city of Paris. He claims to have obtained French patents, but explains that he is unable to reveal the details of his machine pending the acquiring of foreign patents.

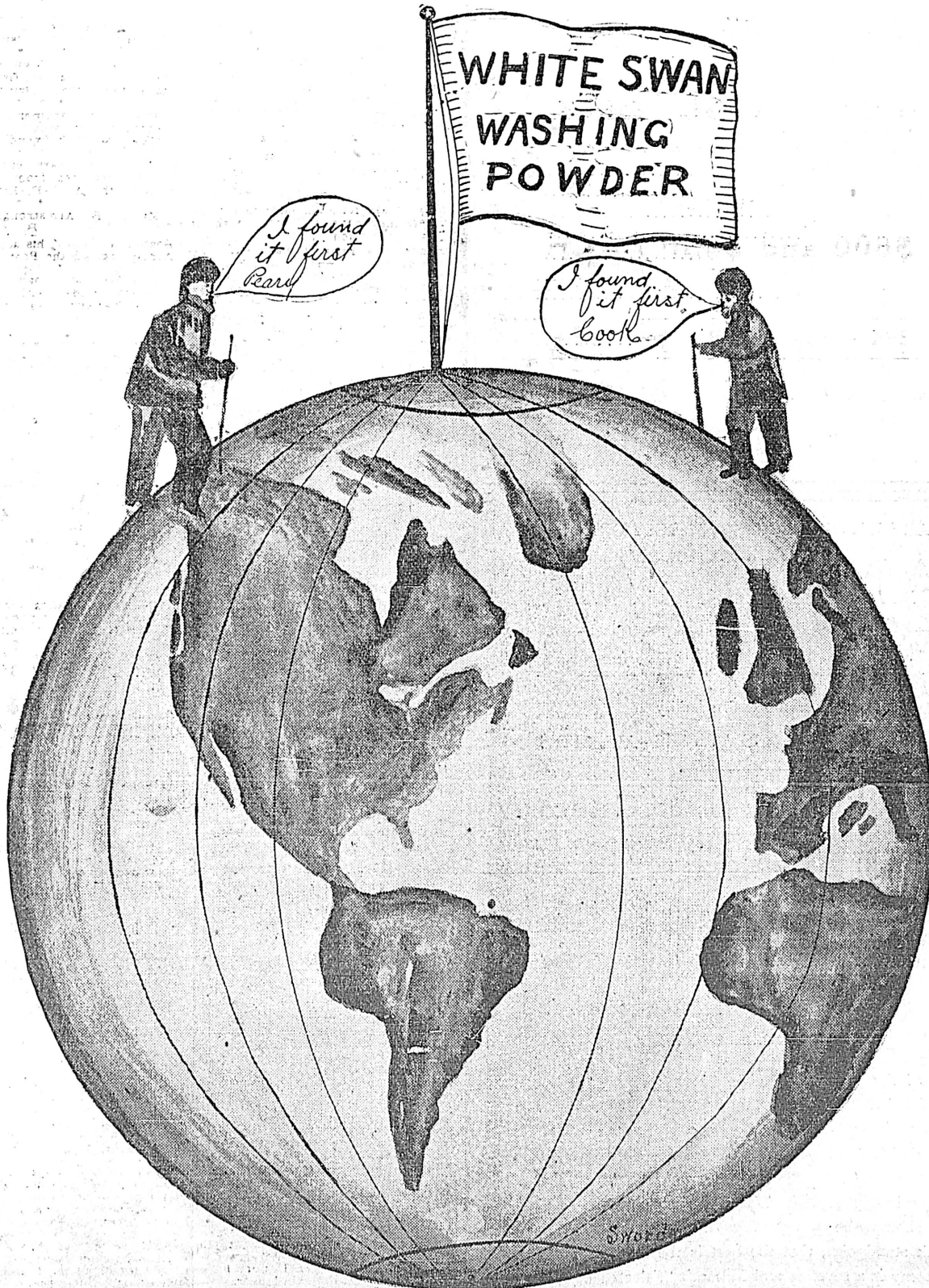

Registered Mail Stolen. VANCOUVER, Sept. 13.—Registered mail sacks from Glasgow were stolen from a car and rifled in the east end of the city last week.

Line Layers Driven Off. TORONTO, Sept. 13.—On Saturday, while a gang of workmen employed by the contractors to lay the transmission line of the hydro-electric power commission were laying bases on the farm of Ed Lane, near Ste. Annes, in Lincoln county, they were attacked by one of the farmers and his men with pitchforks, spades and shovels and ordered to quit the premises.

B. C. Bonds in London. LONDON, Sept. 13.—This week British Columbia bonds, 1917, ranged from 102s. to 104s.

General Wolfe Remembered. LONDON, Sept. 13.—The 150th anniversary of the death of Gen. Wolfe was commemorated yesterday at the church of St. Alfrege, Greenwich. A wreath was laid on the grave by members of his old force of royal marines.

Wireless to South Africa. LONDON, Eng., Sept. 13.—Experiments are about to be made with a view to establishing direct wireless telegraphic service between England and South Africa. It is proposed to elevate kites 11,000 feet, and if these are unsuccessful to erect a station at Gibraltar.

A carload of fruit from Rogue River, Ore., was found to be affected with the codlin moth and ordered condemned by Inspector Cunningham on its arrival in Vancouver Saturday.

Crime Charged to Drink. HARRISBURG, Pa., Sept. 13.—Thomas Dwyer, janitor of the Owls' Nest Club, was shot and killed at the club rooms early today by Wells Detweiler. One of the bullets passed clear through his body, striking Mrs. Dwyer and injuring her slightly.

Found Not Guilty. PITTSBURG, Pa., Sept. 13.—E. B. Saylor, formerly local superintendent of the Western Union Telegraph Co., and Will Smith, a furnisher of stock quotations, were found not guilty today on a charge of conspiracy in connection with the wire tapping scandal prosecuted by the Chicago board of trade.

Indicted Grafters Named. YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio, Sept. 13.—The names of the fifteen men indicted by the special grand jury to receive have been investigating charges of bribery and grafting in city and county affairs were made public here yesterday.

Mexican Troubles. MEXICO CITY, Sept. 13.—The Federal army headquarters of the third military zone continues to receive insistent rumors of an extended outbreak on September 15 and 16 in the northern part of the republic.

AMERICANS WIN DAVIS CUP MATCHES

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 13.—In the first two matches for the right to challenge the Australian holders for the Davis International Challenge Lawn Tennis cup, William A. Larned and Wm. J. Clothier, representing the United States, today defeated respectively C. P. Dixon and J. C. Parke, of Great Britain, without the loss of a set. Larned defeated Dixon 6-3, 6-2, 6-0, and Clothier defeated Parke 6-4, 6-3, 8-6.

America also defeated Great Britain in the third and deciding match of the series, R. D. Little and H. H. Hackett defeating in the double couples J. C. Parke and W. C. Crawley by 3-6, 6-4, 4-6, 8-6. This result decides the preliminary tie, and makes America the challenging nation against Australia, which now holds the coveted blue ribbon of the tennis world.

Tomorrow the singles matches will be continued, W. A. Larned meeting Parke and W. J. Clothier playing C. P. Dixon. The result of these matches will not affect the championship. Six thousand people viewed today's match and had plenty of opportunity to applaud, for after the first set which went to the Englishmen, 6-3, the contest was nip and tuck.

The veteran Little, seemed to be the main objective, and they subjected him to a merciless bombardment of drives and smashes. 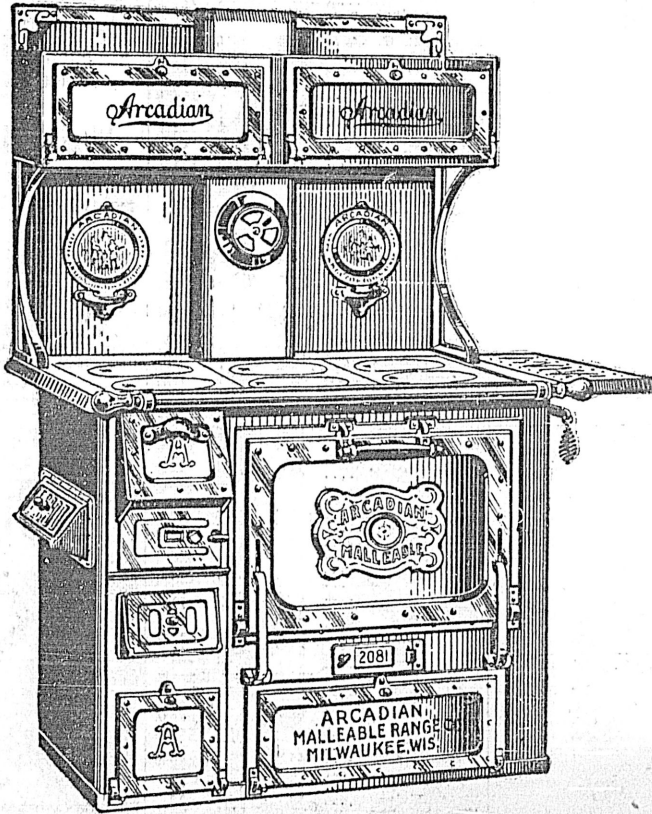
